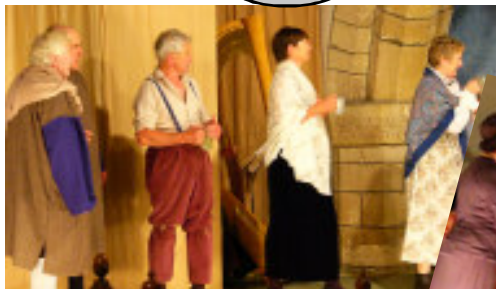

THE VICAR'S VALEDICTION

"I thank my God upon every remembrance of you."

I can't think of any words more appropriate than Paul's greeting to the Christians in Philippi with which to begin this, one of the most difficult letters which I have ever had to write. Of course, not all the memories are happy: looking back I can see all too clearly the opportunities which I let slip, the nettles which I failed to grasp and the times when I knew that I had let someone down. But seldom, or never, did you let me down: the warmth, kindness, understanding and generosity of the people of Bro Cynllaith, not to mention your capacity for sheer hard work, have encouraged and supported me during this last quarter-century.

And how much we have been able to achieve together! I have only space to mention a few of the highlights: the major roof repairs which closed the church for months, the flower festivals, "Dechrau Conu, Dechrau Canmol", the new kneelers, the schoolchildren's "wedding", the restoration of the bells, the pageant only a few weeks ago, and the planning and building of the parish room, still ongoing as I write.

There have been changes too: church and chapel have drawn closer together and women have been admitted to the priesthood – a reform overwhelmingly endorsed by the PCC after a memorable debate. And the congregation has seen its changes. Nowadays, when I walk past the lowest ranks of gravestones in the churchyard, most of the names bring faces to mind – well-loved faces some of them, and others all too young. And a generation has grown up who can remember no other vicar.

When I came here, after a time of anxiety and insecurity when I could never see the future more than a few months ahead, I resolved to stay until I was baptising the children of the children I was baptising then, an ambition which I fulfilled in July when little Llion Jones played a central role at a moving reunion of many of those children, his father among them.

So now, it's time for me to go – though only as far as my "bolt-hole" in the hills. High time, as my cracking joints remind me. I am very sorry that the financial and pastoral crisis in the Church in Wales means that I will probably be the last vicar to live in Llansilin, but the vicarage is to be retained, hopefully to be occupied by a priest on a "house for duty" basis. You may well find yourselves pastorally better off than now, while the officers and PCC are more than capable of running the parish administration and planning imaginative new developments to make the most of the altered church layout and parish room.

As we sang at the end of the pageant, the future's in your hands – and in God's hands too. When I knew that I was coming here, I celebrated with a cup of tea in the old Coach and Dogs café in Oswestry and I was intrigued by the Welsh words carved on an old oak bedhead fixed to the wall: "Wrth Orwedd ac Wrth Godi, Bydded Duw yn Nefoed". I still have them copied out and framed above my own bed, and with those same words I bid you goodbye (which means "God be with you"):

"As you lie down, and as you rise, may God be in Heaven", and may God's blessing rest on this little patch of Heaven on Earth.

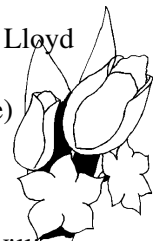

Tributes then came thick and fast from his colleagues: the Reverend M Bennett of Llansantffraid, the Reverend M Balkwill of Llanfyllin and from Canon L Rogers, now retired from Llansantffraid, who sang "Come and join us" as his first piece of advice to the vicar on contemplating his retirement.

Entertainment was provided by members of the Tanat Theatre, demonstrating the contribution made by Kit over the years and making us all laugh at the many occasions on which he had inadvertently re-arranged the scenery or props! The highlight was when Kit himself took to the stage, obviously in his element.

Special and sincere thanks were given to everyone by the Vicar, clearly delighted and overwhelmed by his super "send-off". The evening concluded with Mrs Esther Milner at the piano and everyone heartily singing both the Welsh and English national anthems.

Thank you to everyone who helped in so many ways – too numerous to mention, but you know who you are! Finally, thank you to everyone who came and supported this very special event.

THANKSGIVING SERVICE

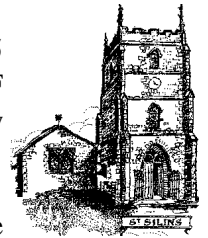
A service of thanksgiving for the Vicar's 25 years ministry in Llansilin was held on the following Sunday afternoon, to a large congregation, with the clergy of the Deanery present. The Reverend M Bennett of Llansantffraid conducted the service, the lessons were read by the Reverend E Yendell of Llanwyddyn and the Reverend M Balkwill of Llanfyllin, the prayers were led by the Reverend J Davies of Llanrhaeadr and the sermon was preached by Canon L Rogers. The service commenced with the Reverend M Bennett welcoming everybody and, during the singing of the first hymn, the clergy processed around

the church, led by the Church Wardens, Esther Milner and Mary Morris, while Margaret Lloyd carried the processional cross.

All the hymns were specially chosen by the Vicar himself and Cor Llansilin sang 'The Lord's my Shepherd' to the tune of the Vicar of Dibley and 'St Patrick's Prayer' by John Rutter. The Reverend M Bennett gave the blessing and the congregation was entertained to refreshments at the end of the service.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

Would you have guessed that in 25 years as Vicar in Llansilin, the Rev C F Carter had baptised 87 to be new members of the Family of God?



As many of these as possible were invited to a special service of thanksgiving and renewal of baptismal vows on 31 July. The church was full of the families and friends of the 35 who were able to attend. The service was made even more memorable by the baptism of Michael Llion Arwyn, son of Anthony and Bethan Jones (formerly of Derwendeg, Llansilin and Pentre Felin, Llangedwyn respectively), thus bringing the Vicar's total to 88. Anthony was himself baptised by the vicar years ago, as were Stephen Sockett, Moeliweh, and Tom Williams, Fron, who took the collection with Church Wardens, Esther Milner and Mary Morris.

THE PARISH ROOM

Readers will have seen the steady progress on the new extension at St Silin's, which we have decided should be known as "The Parish Room". At the time of writing, we are hoping for completion some time in September and the official opening by the Bishop of St Asaph has been arranged for 2 pm on Saturday, 29 October.

On the financial front we have mainly good news, though the heating system will cost us significantly more than the original budget. However, this has been compensated by some further donations and by the excellent performance of the Grand Draw, Promises Auction and the Pageant, which means that we now seem to have reached our minimum target and can make a quiet start to re-building the contingency budget, which was heavily raided to cover the heating costs.

Once again, many thanks to all who have supported us directly and also through the Draw, Auction and Pageant.



THE CHRONICLE OF CYNLLAITH



During the weekend of 2 and 3 July more than 500 people attended St. Silin's church to see the 'Chronicle of Cynllaith'. Their comments as they left were music to the ears of all those involved.

Following a small inaugural meeting before Christmas to consider the feasibility of staging a village pageant, the brain-child of People's Warden, Mary Morris, an open meeting was held in January. Sub-committees to cover all aspects of the production were set up and a team of researchers and script-writers, led by the Vicar, set to work. A technical team looked into possibilities for providing suitable lighting and staging, taking into account that the church is a Grade I listed building. A wardrobe department researched appropriate costumes for the many different ages of the suggested scenes and the front-of-house team tried to anticipate what would be required. Grants were applied for to help finance the project.

Once sufficient script was available the director, Gaynor Richfield of the Tanat Theatre, started rehearsals. It had become clear that a sizeable number of actors would be required to cover the large list of characters and numerous persuading, pleading and arm-twisting 'phone calls were made until, with the support of members of the Tanat Theatre, all the roles were filled.



As weeks went by the village became a hive of industry. Numerous costumes were made or borrowed; diverse props produced; impressive special-effects created and sound-effects acquired; tickets printed; an eye-catching programme-cover was designed, posters and sign-boards were put up and hundreds of flyers were distributed. The church was transformed into a theatre with large areas of staging, a lifting backcloth and stage-lighting. Finally, a marquee was erected in front of the porch for ticket sales, refreshments etc.. Throughout all this time, actors and singers were hard at work rehearsing.

There was great relief when it was discovered, just hours before the first performance, that two doves, which had decided to roost on the beams above the north aisle, threatening to soil the costumes, props and the audience, had finally left. Tickets sales, which had been somewhat slow at first, improved dramatically and Sunday evening was a complete sell out.

The performances were opened with a special banner, made by Llansilin C.R.A.F.T. Group, being paraded

through the church. St. Silin (played by the Vicar, who later assumed the roles of the Bishop of St. Asaph around the year 1200, Kyffin in the early 16th century and, finally, himself) entered and described in a work-song, which was updated several times during the performance, the building of the first wooden church in Llansilin. The audience learned how this was replaced by one of stone on the orders of Einion Efel; burnt to the ground (cleverly portrayed with mock flames, smoke and sound effects) by Prince Hal; rebuilt circa 1500; before it came under noisy musket-fire and was ransacked by the Roundheads. It was finally restored by David Davies in 1890.

As well as following the history of the church, the scenes, all carefully researched but with a dash of artistic licence, brought to life many other local events and characters. These included poets such as Iolo Goch and George Borrow, courtships and scandals, disputes between Welsh and English law, and sound effects of a war-time bomber crashing into Bwlch-y-Rhiw. The dialogue was interspersed and enhanced with accomplished singing, harp-playing and dancing. The final scenes brought us to the present day with the restoration of the bells and lively singing and dancing by the primary school children, accompanied by guitar and drums. The final member of the cast to appear on stage was Oliver Morris, born this year, who heralded the future.

As the performances progressed an initial feeling of relief that everything had gone smoothly turned into euphoria as successive audiences were over-whelmingly complimentary. For a new team, working together for the first time, it had proved to be a very challenging project but extremely worth-while. **Thank you all.**

PS Thanks to the hard work of everyone involved with the production, the proceeds came to £2700 and it has been agreed to donate £1000, in varying amounts, to the following causes: Pennant Melangyll Foundation, Severn Hospice, Gweinidogaeth Bro Llansilin Chapels, Owain Glyndwr Sign Fund, Friends of Llansilin Fountain, Ysgol Bro Cynllaith, Cor Llansilin, PALS (Llansilin Drama Group), St Silin's Overseas Mission (Niger Appeal) and Hope House Hospice. The remainder will go to the Church Redevelopment Fund, as originally planned.

There will be a display of photographs in the Church over the weekend of the village show.

LLANSILIN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

At the Annual General Meeting held on 10 May Cllr D W Davies was appointed chairman and Cllr E T Jones vice-chairman. The retiring chairman, Cllr Mrs M Evans, was thanked for the diligent manner in which she had discharged her duties and she, in turn, thanked members for their support. Everyone signed a "Get well" card to Cllr E O Evans.

CADW had indicated that they had a 5-year management agreement with the occupier of the land at Sycharth to improve the condition of the mound and allow access at reasonable times. They would also endeavour to persuade the highway authority to provide direction signs. The liaison meetings between Powys CC officers and representatives of town and community councils had been very well attended and were most interesting and informative. Further discussion took place on the public conveniences (see the July report below). The service level agreement between the county council and the community council on youth club funding had been signed.

The following planning applications were approved: extension at 11 Maesyllan, Llansilin; alterations and extension at Geufron, Llansilin; installation of septic tank at Tynywaen.

The chairman, vice-chairman and Cllr E O Evans were appointed to serve on the planning sub-committee. Cllrs Mrs Carol Foulkes and E O Evans were re-elected to the Youth Club committee.

A request to improve visibility at the cross roads south of Llansilin, accompanied by a signed petition, was supported. Other complaints included: damaged "30" mile sign near the White House; potholes by Rossett and on Tynycoed road; broken concrete gully near The Mount; active badger sett by Ffrydlyn. Communal litter bin near Cefn Canol chapel requested.

At the July meeting the clerk reported that improvements would be undertaken at the crossroads south of Llansilin and at Derwendeg, subject to the land owners' co-operation. Having previously agreed to assume responsibility for the Llansilin public conveniences, Cllr Carol Foulkes confirmed that she would undertake caretaking duties. Remuneration and hours were agreed. The draft agreement between the two authorities was received and Powys CC agreed to attend to the roof repairs. Members agreed to donate £25 to Hope House and to increase their funding of one issue of the Llansilin Newsletter to £75.

The following planning applications were approved: extensions in Llansilin at Cefn-y-Braich, Fron Lledrod and Tyndor and at Tyncelyn, Cefn Canol; resiting of dwelling at Tynllyn, Moelfre; 2 pairs of semi-detached dwellings at the Old Police Station, Llansilin; 4 houses and 2 bungalows at Bryn Dentyr, Llansilin; erection of overhead lines between Llansilin and Llanrhaeadr.

The clerk was asked to deal with the following: potholes near Rhiwlas village sign and Rhiwlas school; water on the road near Hafod and on road adjacent to Tynyfron and Tyncelyn; bend sign missing in Cefn Canol; unlicensed car on car park; request for Cefn Canol signs on approaches to village. Also to contact the local health authority to request an improvement in the Shrop Doc emergency medical service.
