Outside was grey and dreary, with the rain lashing down and the wind howling through the trees – but we stepped inside the church to a winter wonderland full of colour, light and sheer enchantment. This was our first Village Christmas Tree Festival and it certainly lifted the spirits of all who came and took part.

There were 43 trees in total, designed and decorated by individuals and groups from the whole community, each with a distinctive theme. We had a vibrant tree scorched by the African sun, our school children as “stars”, bats in the belfry, celebrations of agriculture, nature and tea drinking and one with branches which looked suspiciously like Post Office leaflets! One tree was covered in miniature boots “made for walking”, another “taking a bough”, a “Matreemony”, a “Pantree”. If only we had space to describe all 43.



As people walked around slowly, admiring the ingenuity, creativity and wit of the displays, they were accompanied by soothing background Christmas music. The stalls were very popular selling a variety of Christmas goods and the lovely cards, gift tags and boxes made by the C.R.A.F.T. group and other villagers. Hot refreshments fortified everyone before they ventured back out into the storms.

This wasn't just an exhibition. The annual Plygain was held on the Friday evening and the Crown of Light was switched on (reports on other pages). The following morning 27 children turned up for a most enjoyable creative workshop and Saturday evening lived up to its promise of “frivolity and fun” to an appreciative audience. There was a special service on Sunday morning, when the first Advent candle was lit. On Monday afternoon the church was buzzing with groups of children from Ysgol Bro Cynllaith, intent on being the first to complete Alison's fiendish quiz – they did better than the adults, though everyone was fooled by the question on the bells! The festival was rounded off that evening with traditional carols, by the light of the Christmas trees, followed by an auction of donated trees.

So, a very full and exciting weekend, much appreciated by everyone who took part. There are so many thanks to make: to the talented people who provided trees, to all those who helped in many different ways and to everyone who braved the weather to help us raise the magnificent sum of £1,101 for church funds. The biggest thanks of all go to Mary Morris and Alison Beeston, who co-ordinated everything and gave us all such a delightful and memorable experience.

Has anyone any information on the early Llansilin Sheep Dog Trials and Shows?

There is an archive collection of schedules of the more recent shows from 1980 to 2006 and 1954 and 1956. Has anyone kept any earlier schedules to add to the collection? (They can be photocopied). The first shows were in the 1920s. So far two copies have survived - 1926 and 1927. They make very interesting reading and are a wonderful record of how farming has changed. There were competitions for dairy cattle, best Welsh Cob, best Hackney and best vanner! There were horse shoeing classes and shearing. Amongst the produce were classes for 3 mangolds, 12 ears of wheat and barley, 2lbs of butter (confined to holders of 10 acres and under). The sporting competitions included a Quoiting match, for which the first prize was six shillings!

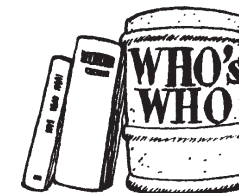

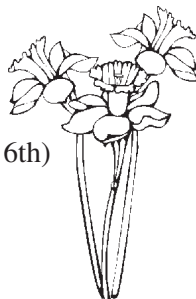

CHRISTMAS SERVICES

Despite the atrocious weather conditions on the evening of 15 December, the Llangadwaladr Carol Service was well attended. It was taken by the Revd Margaret Robarts in the form of readings, carols and prayers. Several members of the congregation took part, namely Mr Hywel Jones, Mr Les Robarts, Mrs Vera Evans, Mrs Sarah James and Mrs Esther Milner, who was also the organist. The collection was taken by Mr Dennis Sockett.

The Revd Margaret Robarts opened St Silin’s Bilingual Carol Service on Sunday, 24 December by gathering together the children, Daniel, Jessica, Hannah, William, Angharad, Elen, Owen and Samuel to bless the “Crib”, which had been arranged by the Moss family. They then all watched the lighting of the Advent Candles by the churchwardens. The service took the form of carols, readings and prayers by members of the congregation. The collection was taken by Mary Morris and the organist was Morfudd Williams. Prayers concluded the service. On leaving the church all the children were given Christmas crackers which had been kindly donated.



The bells of St Silin’s rang out as the well attended congregation entered the festively decorated church for the Christmas Midnight Eucharist, taken by the Revd Margaret Robarts and assisted by Mrs Margaret Lloyd. The Advent candles were lit by the churchwardens, Mrs Esther Milner and Miss Mary Morris. Lessons were read by the Vicar and Mr Eric Avery. The collection was taken by Messrs Dennis and Stephen Sockett. Miss Morfudd Williams was the organist. Thank you to the ladies who decorated the church and to pupils of Ysgol Bro Cynllaith and the C.R.A.F.T. group for their arrangements.

REMEMBRANCE SERVICE

This year it was the turn of St Silin’s church to host the annual Remembrance Service, taken by Revd Margaret Robarts. 36 people attended from Llansilin and Llangedwyn. The Welsh lesson was read by Mrs Ceri Roberts, the collection was taken by Mr Jeffrey Olstead and Mr Glyn Roberts and the organist was Miss Morfudd Williams. Major Ward read out the names from the Memorial and then laid the wreath of red poppies. After the two minutes silence, the Last Post and the Reveille were played by Anna. Mrs Margaret Lloyd raised the Union Jack to full mast. The bells were rung at ½ muffled before the service and then open afterwards. The Vicar and several members then went on to Llangedwyn where a wreath was laid.

At the **November meeting** it was reported that planning consent had been granted for 23 dwellings on land opposite the Wynnstay, which should benefit the school and locality substantially. The high hedge by Ddol Hill would be cut back. Planning applications supported included conversion of a barn to dwelling at Cae Canol, Cefn Canol; conversion of building to dwelling at Priddbwl Bach; new extension at Bryn Teg, Moelfre.

Members agreed a £500 grant to Llansilin Memorial Hall which would enable them to access Powys County Council grants. The Llansilin newsletter (*for which we are all most grateful - editor*), Severn Hospice and the National Eisteddfod were also supported. An application had been submitted to divert a section of the public highway at Rhosddu, Cefn Canol. In response to a questionnaire from Dyfed/Powys Police, it was agreed that priorities included action against anti-social behaviour; increased action against rural crime and improved liaison with adjoining police forces. A card would be placed in the local post office as part of the campaign against post office closures.

Complaints included water on road on Rhydleos bank and Tynyfon turning; obscured vision by Lledrode turning and abandoned cars by Bryn Celyn.

At the **January meeting** the clerk reported that the surface water near Tynyfron turning had been attended to and the overhanging branches of a tree near the Lledrode turning would be lopped. Planning applications supported included erection of double garage, fuel store and sewage treatment plant at Tynewydd, Llansilin; two-storey extension at Tynygroes, Rhiwlas; extension to Minafon, Cefn Canol; erection of dwelling and garage on land between Aelybryn and the Vicarage, Llansilin.

It was agreed to levy a precept of £3000 to meet general rate expense in the year 2007/8. The clerk advised members that this would probably have to be increased next year to meet the cost of a probable election in 2008 and also that the final reduced grant towards the cost of the public conveniences would be received next year.

The clerk was asked to respond to a complaint by a local resident regarding dog fouling, lack of waste bins and appropriate signs, obscured 30 mile signs and excessive speeding through the village. Complaints reported included surface water on road opposite Aelybryn and Glascoed bank; unsafe footbridge below Derwendeg, though it was not clear which authority was responsible for this.

CYMDEITHAS DDYWYLLIADOL LLANSILIN

The **CYMDEITHAS DDYWYLLIADOL LLANSILIN** or, in English, the **LLANSILIN LITERARY SOCIETY** is probably the oldest organisation in Llansilin since the older members recall their predecessors telling them that the society was meeting during the first world war. In those days they would meet in the local chapels since it wasn't until the Memorial Hall was built in 1924 that the meetings of the society took place in the Institute.

In the late 1950's there were three meetings every season, one in November, another in January and a St. David's Day celebration. The price of the tickets for the St David's celebration was 3/- (15p). The Cymdeithas these days meets six times during the winter months culminating with the St. David's Day celebration dinner. These last few years the society has held a bilingual Christmas carol service with the three local "Plygain Parties" taking part and the service has proved to be very popular judging by the attendances of both English and Welsh speakers. All our meetings are held through the medium of the Welsh language but we are very pleased to see our English friends joining us for the St. David's Day dinner who make use of the translation equipment at the hall with a very capable translator in Mrs Carys Evans.

Our meetings have a very varied programme and are very well supported. Every year we try to have at least one local speaker. This year there are two with Mr Llewelyn Ellis giving a talk on Llansilin activities and personalities down the years, ably supported by his wife Edith's solo singing. Mr and Mrs Brian Evans will be telling us about their Autumn 2006 holiday adventures in Patagonia. After we've enjoyed our speakers we also enjoy a cup of tea, sandwiches and cakes and, together with a good chat, another hour passes all too quickly. But that is what the Cymdeithas is all about and long may it continue!

Anyone wishing to obtain a programme of activities please contact the secretary, Sarah James on 791346. The programmes are free but a charge of £1 is made at each meeting with a special ticket price for the St. David's Day dinner which includes a meal, speaker and entertainment.
