Have your say on services in Wales

The audit for year ending March 2013 was presented to councillors. Approval and confirmation that the annual return has been agreed was carried out and the financial position was forwarded to our auditors.

Members were told about the forthcoming One Voice Wales 2013 conference and AGM that will be held on 5 October 2013 at the Royal Welsh Showground, Llanelwdd, Builth Wells.

A notice of consultation from Montgomeryshire Local Council Forum was received to have its name changed to North Montgomeryshire Local Council Forum.

We have been invited to have our say on public services in Wales from the Commission on Public Services Governance and Delivery. The Commission was set up in April 2013 to look hard, honestly and objectively at the way public services are governed and delivered in Wales, and how they can be improved. In answering the questions please consider your own experiences using examples where possible - and contact publicservicecommission@wales.gov.uk or call 02920 826782. A series of informal drop in sessions have also been arranged.

It was noted that we had seen an increase in police presence through the village and surrounding area in the summer months following a recent spell of theft locally.

Pot holes and roads with damage were reported in Cefn Canol, Rhiwlas, Llansilin and a discussion was held regarding some recent parking problems in the car park at Maes y Llan. It was agreed to check on our position with Powys County Council and any enforcements that could be carried out in the future.

Church news

Memorial gets a makeover

Yet again St Silin's finds itself without a vicar. Although the post was advertised on a house-for-service basis there were no applicants and we have been advised to wait a while before readvertising.

Since Rev Tony Dilworth left we have been incredibly lucky in having Leigh Northcott Hammond, our reader, to conduct services and support the church in so many other ways. Alas, his qualities have been recognised by others and as he prepares for ordination he is gaining experience in Welshpool. He takes with him our very sincere thanks and good wishes. Welshpool is fortunate to get a man of so many talents.

Meanwhile all is not lost. Christine Williams has completed her training as a worship leader and together with Esther Milner will be able to take services though we will rely heavily on retired clergy to take communion services. And on that note it was good to see the Rev Kit Carter make a guest appearance on St Giles's day.

The many splendid yew trees are a very special feature of our churchyard. The oldest are reputed to have survived for more than a thousand years, however the heavy spring snow fall brought down a lot of branches. Fortunately we had a wonderful volunteer who worked hard to clear up the debris.

Keeping the churchyard tidy and safe is a constant problem - even repairing a drain required the attendance of an archaeologist. Health and safety regulations impose an extra burden in ensuring that none of the gravestones are at risk of falling. But now one of the most striking memorials in the churchyard has been carefully renovated.

The tall obelisk on the south side it commemorates members of a local farming family from Priddbwl who moved to the Midlands. Several brothers become malsters and one became an iron founder. Another family member was John Thomas, Mayor of Oswestry, and some people might recall the big ironmonger's shop in Church Street, Oswestry, owned by one of the same family .

Now descendants of the family have returned to live in this area and have recently repainted the obelisk and the surrounding iron railings.

The roped off Conservation Area (Ardal Cadwraeth) near the bottom of the churchyard is slowly developing - years of enrichment from grass clippings and the strong growing species of grass have stifled the emergence of the underlying seed bank. Hopefully in a few years we will see interesting new plants able to germinate. If anyone has expertise in this subject we would be so pleased to have help !

Bite Back at Hunger

This year Llansilin Christian Aid Group raised £718.19. That reflects effort and generosity. The effort was supplied by the many workers supporting the leadership of Mrs. Rhianon Lewis and their determination – as always – to do well for people in need. The generosity came from people ready to open their purses and wallets.

The success also reflected both old and new thinking of the group on fund raising. The proven value of house to house collections, chapel and church donations, and the coffee evening continued. There were some changes for the better. Soup and a Sandwich gave way to Tea and a Chat. Importantly Ysgol Bro Cynllaith pupils, and through them their parents, became involved.

A huge thank you to all who helped in whatever way. In many senses our efforts were rewarding. Letters of thanks have been received from Christian Aid.

Stephen's cancer appeal gets some traction

A cavalcade of 28 vehicles set out from the Wynnstay Inn on the August bank holiday weekend for the Three Llans

Tractor Run. The event was organised by Wayne Beach to support the Stephen Powell Cancer Research Fund and raised more than £1,000.

Stephen, a well-known character in the village who runs Hall's office in Oswestry, is himself fighting cancer and set up the fund which has now raised more than £14,000.

Setting off in brilliant sunshine alongside the tractors there were also vintage cars and motorcycles tackling the 22 mile journey from Llansilin. The first stage took them to Llanarmon, where there was a pause for refreshments at The Hand, and then they pressed on to Llanrhaeadr for lunchtime fish and chips before heading back to Llansilin where the Wynnstay laid on a barbecue.

Having just finished his chemotherapy Stephen was able to address the participants and the crowd of well-wishers that gathered to see them off before taking part in the cavalcade in his own 1967 Ford 3000. Afterwards he said he was very pleased with the support the run had received and delighted by the amount raised since the fund was launched in January.

The fund received a big boost when Rosemary Edwards from Llansilin celebrated her 70th birthday with lunch at The Hand Hotel in Chirk and asked for donations to the research fund. The result was a staggering £605.

Preserving Llansilin's unexpected heritage

Our village might look modest to the casual visitor - but it is a treasure house of heritage. Our red phone box at the top of the village is one of the few not demolished in the course of modernisation and changing technology - it has been listed by Cadw for preservation.

Several village houses date back very many years and are also listed. St Silin's Church is a treasure, full of interest, and receives the highest Grade 1 while the isolated Llangadwaladr Church has been classed as Grade 2.

The village fountain is also Grade 2 - so we really must look after it. In the surrounding valley a number of farms reveal a long past history - not only in the farm house but also in some of the farm yard buildings and they, too, are listed for preservation.

A new start for Llangadwaladr

Llangadwaladr church has been saved – at least for the time being - and the Bishop of St Asaph himself will be visiting St Cadwaladr's for its harvest festival.

Local concern that the diocese wanted to close the church has produced a strong response and a new parochial church council has been elected together with two churchwardens.

Since the roof of the church needs urgent attention applications for grants have been made to two charitable trusts. Unfortunately the Victorians' over-enthusiastic renovation destroyed most of the building's medieval heritage which makes it difficult to make a strong case for funding. However its sweet simplicity and uniquely beautiful setting have attracted visitors from all over the world.



The first mention of the church is in 1291 but the yew trees in the churchyard are considerably older. Apart from some walls only a lancet window in the vestry remains of the ancient building.

Llangedwyn was part of the parish of Llanrhaeadr until 1877 when it became a parish in its own right. However in the 1980s much of the parish in the upper Ceiriog valley was transferred to Llanarmon DC leaving little support for the existing church.

Although regular services are not yet planned there will be special services throughout the year. On Sunday 29 September there is a joint service with Llansilin and Llangedwyn and the harvest festival, to be attended by Bishop Gregory, will be on 6 October.

The churchwardens are: Richard Pugh, Ty Gwyn 791380 and Lowri Thomas, Moelfre Hall 791218.



A Welsh icon comes to Llansilin

One of Wales' best known actors is bringing his one-man show *Burton* to Llansilin. Rhodri Miles won the Best International Artist award at the Hollywood Fringe Festival for his portrayal of Welsh icon Richard Burton.

The show depicts Burton's often hilarious, melancholic, self-deprecating take on life from humble beginnings in Pontrhydyfen to Hollywood stardom, and culminates in his acrimonious first divorce from Elizabeth Taylor. Describing Burton, Rhodri said; "He was a great thespian actor, an alcoholic womaniser who often said that his natural disposition to the Celtic gloom was caused by the mist in the hills and the black in the coal, all of it seeping into his very being."

Burton is Saturday 23 November in St Silin's church at 7.30pm. Tickets cost £9 and £4 for children. This includes refreshments and tickets are available from Rowanthorn in Old Chapel Court, Oswestry.
